Jeffrey von Arx, SJ, president of the university, welcomed the group and Fr. Walter (Skipp) Conlan, SJ, rector of the Jesuit community at Fairfield, led the group in an opening prayer.

During Session 1, Fr. Thomas Regan, SJ, provincial, Fr. Michael Boughton, SJ, and Fr. Ronald Mercier, SJ, shared their experience at the 35th General Congregation. After lunch, Fr. John (Jack) Butler, SJ, vocation director, introduced a panel on vocation and ministry in Session 2. Ms. Donna Andrade, Ms. Barbara Kiernan, Fr. Myles Sheehan, SJ, and Fr. George Williams, SJ, discussed their ministries in education, health care, and prison ministries. Fr. Regan closed the day with his State of the Province address—his sixth and final address as provincial. Using key insights, themes, and the decrees, or documents from the recent General Congregation—With Renewed Vigor and Zeal, A Fire that Kindles Other Fires, Challenges to Our Mission Today, Obedience in the Life of the Society of Jesus, Governance at the Service of Universal Mission, and Collaboration at the Heart of Mission. Fr. Regan reflected on his hopes and challenges for the New England Province. Later that afternoon, the group adjourned to the Egan Chapel of St. Ignatius to join family and friends of Fr. James Hederman, SJ, for his final vow liturgy. The following day, the group reassembled in the Egan Chapel for the ordination of Fr. Joseph Palmisano, SJ, to the priesthood.
